## CHATHAM INTERSECTION (ROUTES 41 & 841) AND GATEWAYS PROJECT UPDATE

PennDOT has been actively working on alternatives for improvements to the Routes 41 and 841 intersection in Chatham, as well as on other improvements in the village. They have held a number of public meetings in the last 12-18 months to solicit public input. By the time this newsletter is published, PennDOT will have held another public meeting seeking input on the proposed “gateways” for Route 41 at locations north and south of Chatham.

The purpose of that public meeting, held on June 21<sup>st</sup>, was to review preliminary plans for the construction of gateways at each end of the village. PennDOT is proposing the acceleration of the gateway/street enhancement project to provide relief to some concerns expressed at the earlier public workshops. The gateways are compatible with the intersection improvement alternatives under study and they should have minimal impact on the surrounding area. Therefore, PennDOT intends to advance the gateways at a faster pace to provide traffic calming benefits to the village. It is planned that construction on the two gateways will commence in 2017.

On the other hand, the improvement alternatives at the Route 41/Route 841 intersection are still being studied. These alternatives will be fine-tuned to minimize environmental impacts and to address public comment. Due to the complexity of the engineering solutions, natural features and impacts described in the planning study, it may take several years to determine the preferred alternative for this intersection and secure environmental approvals. The alternatives under consideration can be viewed at [www.pa41.com](http://www.pa41.com). Also, hard copies of the alternatives are available for viewing at the Township office. The alternatives PennDOT is recommending for further study are: Alternatives 5A, 5B, 6, 9 and 10.

PennDOT is open to public feedback and ideas for improving the intersection of Route 41 and 841. **MS4 Tip:**

Citizens can help report violations or problems they notice in their local streams before they cause more damage and pollution. Residents sometimes may be the first to recognize “illicit” discharges being directed into storm sewers or flowing out of storm sewer outfall pipes into streams. “Dry weather flows” (flow from storm sewer outfall pipes after 72 hours or more without rain) should be reported to your municipality for further investigation.

**CATCH THE RAIN!  
GET CREEK WISE IN WHITE CLAY

Stormwater washing off land during rain events is the largest source of pollution to the White Clay Creek. In fact, almost all of the rain falling on roofs, driveways, roads, parking lots, mowed lawns, and patios ends up as stormwater runoff. In contrast, rain falling on forests and meadow, natural sponge-like surfaces, soaks gradually into the ground, filtering out pollutants, replenishing groundwater, and keeping streams flowing. Green Stormwater Infrastructure (GSI) practices can incorporate the capture and detention of rainfall, simulate natural soil filtering, and reduce stormwater volumes and speeds. Reduced lawn sizes additionally lessen the need for mowing and fertilizer/pesticide applications. In fact, lawns have approximately the same coefficient of runoff as a driveway! Well-managed GSI practices on your property or in your neighborhood enhance community aesthetics, increase property values 5% or more, and provide important habitat for wildlife and native plants.

The White Clay Wild & Scenic River Program, in partnership with the Brandywine Conservancy, is reaching out to homeowners in the White Clay watershed interested in learning more about green stormwater techniques that they can use in their yards. We are offering educational training, and financial and technical support to install voluntary stormwater management practices including rain barrels, rain gardens and infiltration trenches, pervious paving

retrofits or removal of existing paving, conservation plantings, and canopy tree plantings.


The program targets suburban homeowners and possibly homeowners’ associations, especially in older subdivisions lacking stormwater detention or filtration. Your project could be simply planting native shade trees over your driveway, installing an eye-catching bed of native wildflowers, or catching the runoff from your roof to reuse on your lawn or garden. These small projects intended to catch water at its source can ‘green’ your neighborhood, boost your property values, save you money, and help the White Clay flow clear.

The Park and Recreation Board (PRB) has been asked to work with canine owners to resolve the issues that resulted in the dog park closure. We held a special meeting regarding this subject on June 15th, 7 pm at the Township Building. The Parks and Recreation Board will take your ideas and solutions and report to the Board of Supervisors, so we make sure the situation does not repeat itself.

Goddard Park has a new bridge that connects the middle section of the park to the Stonecroft Development. What used to be a muddy and difficult crossing, is now a lovely stroll over the nicest bridge in the park with a newly mulched path. ## 6 TOP SUMMERTIME DANGERS BY: DAWN MACIEJCZYK

Did you know that more accidents occur during the warm weather months than any other time of year? As people head outdoors and enjoy what summer has to offer, they're not always the most careful. Here are potential dangers right around the corner.

1. Sunburn: Failure to apply -- and reapply -- sunblock can result in a nasty burn. Not only can it be painful, it could lead to dangerous skin cancer.
2. Dehydration: Couple hot weather with outdoor exertion and a person can quickly get thirsty. Failure to replenish liquid lost through sweating and activity can result in dehydration. Fainting, feeling nauseous and headaches can occur.
3. Food poisoning: Hot weather and improperly stored food can result in food poisoning. If you'll be eating outdoors, cold foods must remain cold and hot foods should be kept warm to prevent spoilage. Don't eat any food

that has been sitting outside for more than an hour. Food poisoning symptoms often come on suddenly and can include vomiting and diarrhea.

4. Insects: Bugs love warm weather, too. Mosquitos, bees, wasps, spiders, and all of the other winged and multi-legged creatures come out from their roosts when the temperature climbs. It's more common for people to come in contact with potentially poisonous or bothersome insects.
5. Water: Drownings in pools, lakes and rivers definitely increase as the weather gets warmer. Always practice the utmost care in and around water. Safety vests are essential.
6. Vehicles: Longer amounts of sunshine tend to keep people outdoors longer. This can mean running errands or cruising around with the top down. With more cars on the road, vehicular accidents can increase, primarily when alcohol is involved. Enjoy your summer by staying safe and avoiding common dangers.

**Strawberry Cheesecake Pops****Ingredients**

- 1(5 oz) can evaporated low-fat milk
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 3 oz. 1/3 less fat cream cheese, softened
- 1/4 cup plain fat-free Greek yogurt
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 3 tablespoons light-colored corn syrup
- 1 teaspoon lemon juice
- 10 oz. strawberries hulled
- 1/4 cup graham cracker crumbs

**Preparation**

1. Combine milk and sugar in a saucepan over medium heat, cook 3 minutes. Place cream cheese in a medium bowl; gradually add milk mixture, whisking until smooth. Stir in yogurt and vanilla. Cool completely.
2. Place corn syrup, juice and berries in a blender, process until smooth. Divide half of cream cheese mixture among 6 (4 ounce) ice pop molds. Top with strawberry mixture, followed by remaining cream cheese mixture. Stir slightly with a skewer. Freeze 4 hours or until solid.
3. Unmold ice pops; dip tips in graham cracker crumb.

**NEW PUBLIC WORKS MAINTENANCE GARAGE AND SALT SHED**

Many residents may be curious about the work that is going on in the field next to the Township Building. The answer to the question “What is going on?” is that work has begun on the construction of a new Public Works Department Maintenance Garage and salt storage shed. After housing the London Grove Township Road Crew and Public Works Department (PWD) for 62 years, it was time to move out of the Gap-Newport Pike facility and into a new home for the growing department.

The old garage and salt shed served their purpose but are inadequate for the current operations of the PWD. The Township had approximately 2,000 residents when the facility was built; today we are home to roughly 8,500 people. The Department maintained significantly less road miles 62 years ago than we have today, as they currently maintain 60 miles of road (one of the top five amounts in the County). The new facilities will improve Department operations in the following ways: provide better working conditions for

employees, address the lack of space and inefficiency of the existing buildings, provide for adequate parking for vehicles/equipment and storage for supplies as well as provide quicker and safer highway access.

The Township will also be making overall improvements to the 372 Rose Hill Road property as a part of the project including: repaving of the parking lot and paving the stone parking lot, new outdoor lighting, new storm water management and a generator to provide emergency power to both the PWD garage and Township building.

The new maintenance garage and salt shed are being planned to accommodate the PWD for the next 20-30 years. When completed, the new garage will be 15,000 s.f. compared to the 6,000 s.f. building the department now works out of whereas the capacity of the salt shed will go from 300 tons of salt to 1,000 tons. Bids for the work will be opened in late June 2016 and the Board of Supervisors will consider awarding the contract in early July. Work should begin in the fall.

**STATE ROAD/SCHOOLHOUSE ROAD SIDEWALK PROJECT**

The Board of Supervisors has made it a priority of the Township to construct a sidewalk along State Road between the intersections of Schoolhouse Road and Route 841/Prospect Avenue. A short stretch of sidewalk will also be constructed on Schoolhouse Road. The Board believes that sidewalks in these locations will address the public safety problem posed by Middle School and High School aged students walking along, and in, the roads to and from school. Accordingly, the Board added this project to the Township’s Capital Improvements Plan (CIP) and is taking steps to move forward with construction.

The steps taken by the Supervisors to make this project a reality are both financial and administrative. First, the Township has allocated Capital Improvement Fund monies and bond proceeds towards the project. Also, Staff completed and filed two applications for

grants this past winter to the Multimodal Transportation Fund (MTF) and the Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP). Second, the Board directed Staff to prepare a Request for Proposals (RFP) for engineering services to prepare the necessary plans and manage the project. Finally, letters were sent to the property owners along the south side of State Road as this is the side of the street the planning sidewalk will be constructed. The reason this side was selected was there are fewer surface/sub-surface utility conflicts and fewer utility poles to be relocated. Utility conflicts and pole relocation greatly increase the cost of a project.

It is anticipated that the project will likely begin in the spring of 2017.

**SEASONAL REMINDERS**

**Roadway Property Maintenance**

Each homeowner in our Township is responsible for the maintenance and upkeep of their property along state and Township roads. Cutting back vegetation and keeping this area free of litter, especially after storms, is the key to maintaining the attractive nature of our community. Summer is the time for beautifying and keeping our roads safe.



**Poison Ivy**

It's that time of year again. For those of you who suffer even when you just look at a leaf, here are

some effective ways to combat the effects of poison ivy.

1. Mix bluestone (copper sulfate)



with water and apply it to the area. The infected area scabs over immediately and the itching is relieved.

2. Apply HOT, (as hot as you can stand without scalding) wet washcloths to the affected area twice a day and then apply calamine lotion. You will get a very intense sensation from the application of heat, but will have no itching for the next 8 to 12 hours. The easiest way to heat the washcloths is in your good old fashioned microwave.



3. Use white vinegar. When it itches, scratch to your heart's content but use vinegar on the area first and then break the blisters. They dry up quickly and don't spread. Keep some in each vehicle; so if you start itching, you can relieve it quickly and not unintentionally spread it.





Winter's stranglehold on the weather patterns in our area finally appears to have loosened, and the Inniscrone Golf Club is ready for the late spring/early summer season! Recent months have seen continued improvements to the course and facilities, making for an enjoyable day of golf in (or, at least very close to) your neighborhood!

First, the course itself: following on major improvements over the past few years, General Manager, Thomas Bolko and his staff continue to make the course more playable, while maintaining the appeal of a challenging layout. For example, in the spring of 2014 the split fairway on the 16<sup>th</sup> hole was combined into a single two-tiered landing area, which reduced the required precision off the tee but kept the original design of the hole unchanged. Around the same time, the forced carry on the approach shot on hole number 10 was altered, and imposing trees were removed from the fairway of the 6<sup>th</sup> hole, and near the 11<sup>th</sup> tee box.

In the last few weeks, the 13<sup>th</sup> fairway has been regraded, and the waste area leading up to the green was removed. This makes the hole much easier to navigate, both as a golfer, and as the driver of a golf cart! As summer progresses, work to improve various bunkers around the course will continue and new forward tee boxes will be opened on holes 13 and 16.

The summer will also bring young golfers back to the course for various camps and programs. The Junior Golf Camp will run the second and third weeks of July, for kids between the ages of 8 and 12. A High School Golf Prep Camp will run the last week in July and the first week in August, for 9-12 year olds. Of course, you don't need to be a junior to improve your game, with private and group lessons always available from our pro, Patrick Keefe.

We would also like to inform you of two programs that are an important part of developing Inniscrone's reputation, both locally and regionally. Our new Rewards Program is designed for golfers in the area who will be able to take advantage of Member discounts and incentives. For \$49 (which includes a round of golf), members of the Rewards Program earn points that can be redeemed for golf or merchandise. And they will be invited to Members

only promotions and events at the course. And don't forget that Township Residents always get a 10% discount on greens fees without having to join the Rewards Program.

For the larger Middle Atlantic golfing community, Inniscrone has gained invaluable exposure as part of the Raspberry Golf Trail ([www.raspberrygolftrail.com](http://www.raspberrygolftrail.com)), a collection of 18 top rated golf courses ranging as far as Stafford, Virginia to Fleetwood, Pennsylvania. Golfers who join the Raspberry Trail (for a mere \$5) can earn a free round of golf after playing three different member courses. 


RECYCLING CORNER BY: DAWN MACIEJCZYK

**Recycling** is the process of converting waste materials into reusable objects to prevent waste of potentially useful materials, reduce the consumption of fresh raw materials, energy usage, air pollution (from incineration) and water pollution (from landfilling) by decreasing the need for "conventional" waste disposal and lowering greenhouse gas emissions compared to plastic production. Recycling is a key component of modern waste reduction and is the third component of the "Reduce, Reuse and Recycle" waste hierarchy.

There are some International Standards Organization (ISO) standards related to recycling such as ISO 15270:2008 for plastics waste and ISO 14001:2004 for environmental management control of recycling practice.

Recyclable materials include many kinds of glass, paper, metal, plastic, tires, textiles and electronics. The composting or other reuse of biodegradable waste, such as food or garden waste—is also considered recycling. Materials to be recycled are either brought to a collection center or picked up from the curbside, then sorted, cleaned and reprocessed into new materials destined for manufacturing.



In the strictest sense, recycling of a material would produce a fresh supply of the same material—for example, used office paper would be converted into new office paper, or used polystyrene foam into new polystyrene. However, this is often difficult or too expensive (compared with producing the same product from raw materials or other sources), so "recycling" of many products or materials involves their *reuse* in producing different materials (for example, paperboard) instead. Another form of recycling is the salvage of certain materials from complex products, either due to their intrinsic value (such as lead from car batteries, or gold from circuit boards), or due to their hazardous nature (e.g., removal and reuse of mercury from thermometers and thermostats).
